27TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Christ words apply to all of us. Most of us are inclined to forget God when our earthly affairs are going well. Too many of us forget God and fail to give Him the thanks and the credit for our well-being. We rush to Him only when trouble strikes. In His infinite goodness He often answers such panic prayers. If we had thought of Him every day and realized His place in our lives how much more confident would we be to approach Him in our hour of special need?

Our work for God's kingdom and for the salvation of ourselves and of our neighbor is like the Apostles. Are we really dutiful servants in this regard? Ask ourselves: What have I done up to now to help to make God known to my neighbor who is ignorant of God and never thinks of what will happen him after death?

The sincere Christian can find many ways to help to make Christ known to his neighbor without going on the foreign missions. A quiet word, a charitable gesture, a truly unselfish interest in a neighbor's troubles, coming from a sincere layman can do more good than a series of sermons given by a renowned theologian in the parish church.

God is worthy of all the love we can offer, all the praises we can sing, all the good we can perform, all the trust we can muster. And yet when we have done all this we still must say, "We have done no more than our duty."

THE USE OF SACRAMENTALS

HOLY WATER

For Catholics, water is first and foremost a reminder of our baptism—one of the most significant events in the life of a Christian. In baptism, we are freed from sin, born anew spiritually, and adopted into the covenant family of God.

Use and Power

Holy water is used in the rites of the church for blessing churches, altars, and other objects.

Holy water is also used to bless ourselves before entering and leaving a church. Blessing ourselves with holy water upon entering a church reminds us that baptism was how we entered the Church, the Body of Christ.

Holy water can also be bottled and taken home for personal use. Many Catholics have holy water fonts in their homes. Again, you can use this sacramental for blessing yourself before bed, when entering and leaving the home or for blessing your children.

Why use holy water?

- Holy water has the power to forgive venial sins. When we turn to God and remember our baptism, in which we vowed to reject sin and Satan, our sins are forgiven!
- Holy water prepares us to receive the sacraments. With our sins forgiven, our baptism remembered, and with God's blessing upon us, we are ready to receive the grace of the sacraments, especially the Eucharist.
- Demons hate holy water. St. Teresa of Avila said, "I have found by experience that there is nothing from which the devils fly more quickly than from holy water. They also fly from the cross, but they return almost immediately. The power of holy water must be great. Use Holy water to protect yourself, your family, or your home from the attacks of the evil one!
